CRISIS RESOURCE CENTERS EXPAND INTO WAUKESHA

On the 16th anniversary of the first Crisis Resource Center being opened, CFI proudly unveiled a new CRC in Waukesha County in December. The CRCs are community-based psychiatric crisis intervention programs that provide recovery-focused assessment, stabilization, psychosocial groups and peer support.

The CRCs are an innovative, highly personalized response to people experiencing a crisis precipitated by mental illness, substance abuse or the challenges of living in hard economic times. Annually, the CRCs assist more than 300 people who are struggling with mental health traumas.

Program funding for the Crisis Resource Centers is in partnership with Milwaukee County DHHS and Waukesha County DHHS.



Johnny Ramirez got his first job working at Culver's when he was 33 years old. He is a dining room attendant at the company's Miller Park Way location on Milwaukee's south side.

He wanted the job because he wanted to help his mom at home, but to also fix a ceiling fan in his bedroom. When he got the job, it was an exciting moment for he and his family.

With the help of his job coach and CFI's Employment Services program, Johnny is learning and developing skills each and every day. It is because of Johnny's hard work, he and his family are thriving. In November 2023, Johnny was selected as the Culver's Employee of the Month at his location.

People with barriers to work – including disabilities and past criminal convictions – benefit from skill development and education, placement, and coaching to help them gain and maintain meaningful employment and improve their social and emotional health.

In 2023, more than 350 people were placed into jobs through the employment services program. In addition, 35 new employers joined the CFI employment placement network.

"I'M LIVING MY BEST LIFE"

Tristen Campbell is a survivor and an inspiration. In a three-year span, he had three strokes, including one while on the operating table undergoing brain surgery in 2019.

Tristen was born with a disease called moyamoya – a rare, incurable progressive cerebrovascular disorder caused by blocked arteries at the base of the brain. It diminishes the amount of oxygen being carried to his brain, which can lead to a stroke. Tristen turned to CFI's Brain Health program in 2019 to improve not only his speech but also his quality of life. "Tristen has come a very long way since he first started with us," said Taylor Anderson, case manager/Brain Health Day Program. Tristen has found many ways to be active and involved with his peers while at CFI – Meals on Wheels, art, bowling and playing board games.

"They're like my second family," Tristen said about his peers and the staff at CFI, also adding, "I'm living my best life."
